Mental Health First Aid 1.30 - 6.00pm (pre-booked)

The Blended <u>Mental Health First Aid</u> <u>Course</u> is a combination of online (eLearning) and a half day of face-toface training.

The online pre-learning aspect takes approximately 3-4 hours and should be completed before attending the conference but within 3 months of the

session. Content will include mental health problems, mental health crises and provision of initial assistance to an adult developing a mental health problem or in a mental health crisis.

The face-to-face workshop will provide an opportunity to apply this knowledge and skills to specific scenarios.

Participants then complete a short online assessment in order to receive a Mental Health First Aider Certificate of Accreditation which is valid for 3 years. Accredited Mental Health First Aiders are eligible to be appointed as Mental Health First Aid Officers in the workplace.

CPR Update 1.30pm - 3.30pm (pre-booked)

The CPR update is a popular feature of the ASM, providing delegates with an opportunity to meet their certification requirements.

This year we have secured the services of Premium Health, who will conduct the 2 hour course encompassing face-to-face training and assessment.

In line with the specifications for <u>HLTAID001 Provide</u> <u>cardiopulmonary resuscitation</u>, the course will cover:

- Response to an emergency situation
- Performance of CPR procedures
